# Italians love Slovenia

Italian travelers are number one on the list as Slovenia's top foreign visitors for May, new figures released by the Slovenian Tourist Board (STB) have revealed.

According to the new figures, 69 percent of all foreign overnight stays was accounted for by visitors from Italy with 23 percent, Austria with 15 percent, Croatia with 13 percent, Germany percent, the United Kingdom with percent and Hungary percent.



STB said that tourist accommodation facilities registered 659,121 tourist arrivals and 2,022,199 overnight stays in the first four months of 2008. "The total number of overnight stays in the first four-month period was down by 1 percent year on year. The number of overnight stays of domestic tourists rose by 5 percent, whereas the number of overnight stays of tourists from abroad dropped by 5 percent. In April 2008 compared to April 2007, tourist accommodation facilities registered an 11 percent drop both in tourist arrivals and overnight stays."

Furthermore, the STB added that overnight stays of tourists from abroad accounted for 53 percent of the total number of overnight stays recorded in the first four months of 2008.

Where on earth is Slovenia? The Slovenian Tourist Board recommends several guidebooks and monographs have come out recently. The below is a few of the tourist board's suggestions:

Jože Plečnik – In Ljubljana and Slovenia, a guide and map to architectural masterpieces by Jože Plečnik, a widely known and recognized architect at home and abroad, was published in 2007 by Cankarjeva Založba in the Slovene, English and Italian languages. His work left an indelible, unique mark on Ljubljana, matching it with the beauty of other European capitals.

Od dobre gostilne do nobel prenočišča (From a good inn to a great place to spend the night in Slovenia) is a tourist handbook by authors Drago Medved and Peter Rebernik, which came out in 2007 in four language versions (Slovene, English, German and Italian). On 172 colour pages, it features a selection of 160 good inns, guesthouses, tourist farms and hotels from all over Slovenia. It is primarily intended for travelers who tour Slovenia without predefined itineraries, who choose a place to take a break on the fly.

Ustvarjalna Slovenija (Creative Slovenia) by Janez Bogataj, is written as a guidebook to Slovenia. It features presentations of individual regions, gives an overview of the creativity of craftsmen, innkeepers, winemakers and internationally renowned Slovenian companies, and lists all of Slovenia's patented products. It was first published by Rokus Publishing in 2005. The book lists 162 craftsmen with detailed contact information and 193 inns and winemakers with full addresses; it also boasts 27 maps and 464 photographs. Also available in English.

Slovenija v presežnikih (Slovenia in Superlatives) is a monograph by photographer Tomo Jeseničnik, whose photographs and descriptions feature Slovenia's distinctive attributes, such as the most popular spot, the deepest natural lake and the highest waterfall. The 223 pages contain 101 superlatives and 303 photographs. Published by Mladinska Knjiga Publishing House, Ljubljana, in 2008, it will soon be available in English and German.

Moja Slovenija (Slovenia, My Country) is a photo monograph by Joco Žnidaršič, author of several photo monographs on Slovenia (The Lipizzan Horses, Slovenian Vineyards, See You at the Market, Golf in Slovenia), available in English, and The Lipizzan Horses also in German. All the monographs were published by Veduta AŽ, d.o.o.

Cerkniško jezero (Lake Cerknica) is a 247-page photo monograph by Andreja Peklaj, with Slovene and English-language descriptions of the intermittent Lake Cerknica, an unmatched phenomenon in this part of the globe, whose dry bed during the year is a place of ploughing, planting, harvesting, mowing, hunting and fishing. The Slovenian National Commission for UNESCO crowned the book with the Decade Label in recognition of its important contribution to the protection and preservation of Slovenia's natural and cultural heritage.

Slovenia is the tourist guide from the Lonely Planet series, in which author Steve Fallon describes Slovenian cities, towns and wine regions, and lists adventure sites and interesting places to stay. It comes complete with maps.

The Rough Guide to Slovenia, from the Rough Guides series, written by Norm Longley, discovers Slovenia, from the capital Ljubljana to magnificent lakes and mountains, karst phenomena and possibilities for adventure and exploration.

**US fast food chain Burger King is to open its franchises in Slovenia soon. Reports say that Polish firm AmRest signed a preliminary agreement with Burger King Europe to open its restaurants in the Czech Republic, Slovakia and Slovenia.**

**Burger King's toughest competitor will be McDonald's, the only major international fast food chain currently operating in Slovenia, which has 15 restaurants.**

**However, McDonalds, which opened its first restaurant in Slovenia in 1993, was not the first fast food chain to open in Slovenia.**

**Dairy Queen opened before the golden arches, but called it quits in the late 1990s. The same happened with Quick, a Franco-Belgian chain, and Subway, which closed its only restaurant in Ljubljana last year.**

**AmRest operates franchises of global brands such as Pizza Hut, Starbucks and KFC in Poland, the Czech Republic, Hungary, Bulgaria, Serbia and Russia.**

# Slovenian records, artifacts have new home at Slovenian Museum and Archives

After spending more than a century as the primary destination for Slovenian immigrants, Cleveland finally has a permanent home for the items telling the story of Slovenian heritage – both past and present.

The Slovenian Museum and Archives (SMA), which was officially dedicated June 22, will house records, articles, documents, textiles, photographs, and other research materials documenting the experiences of its Slovenian immigrant community.

Although centered on Cleveland, which is home to the largest population of Slovenians outside the country itself, the museum and archives also includes artifacts and records from the other Slovenian communities throughout the United States and the rest of the world.

The SMA explores the rich history of Slovenians in America, starting with the immigrant experience and family histories, and continuing to the establishment of Slovenian neighborhoods, cultural and musical groups, churches and religious associations, and fraternal organizations.

The SMA was founded, developed and is managed entirely by a board of members of the Cleveland-Slovenian community, ensuring accuracy and personal dedication to the endeavor. Slovenian items and artifacts will continuously be on display, rather than saved solely for special exhibits as part of a larger collection. The executive board has been meeting for more than a year and a half to achieve continuity and ensure that the SMA lasts for future generations of Slovenians. Items donated to the SMA will be preserved professionally with knowledge, care and attention to detail.

The office and information center, which is part of the museum, archives and library, is located at 6415 St. Clair Ave. The museum itself will be housed within the Slovenian National Home.

Once completed, the SMA will contain the archives and a library for researchers from the United States and abroad, as well as the museum for visitors curious about Slovenian culture and heritage.

The event on June 22 saw Slovenian Ambassador to the United States Samuel Zbogar officially unveil the dedication plaque for the SMA, as well as a program featuring a presentation from architect Anthony Hiti, who explained the plans for the future, and speeches from SMA President Robert Hopkins and Johanna Bajc, who spoke on behalf of the Consulate General of



the Republic of Slovenia. The program also included the singing of the Slovenian and American national anthems by Fantje na Vasi and Mi Smo Mi under the direction of John Srsen, as well as a dance performance by Folklorna Skupina Kres.

The well-attended event included tours of the new offices with displays by the Slovenian Genealogy Society and the Slovenian Art Guild. Tours were also conducted at the mansion, located at 6409 St. Clair Ave., which will house artwork from the early days of the Slovenian-American communities.

The main hall of the Slovenian National Home provided a glimpse of the museum exhibitions to come upon completion of the SMA. The exhibits were divided into four displays, each conveying an element of the Slovenian culture, and included the immigrant experience, fraternal organizations, Slovenian religious life and Senator Frank Lausche. The exhibits were filled with items that were on temporary loan to the SMA, and included a desk formerly used by Senator Lausche, which was on loan from the Slovene Home for the Aged.

Fraternal organizations no longer in existence were the feature of that exhibit, which included banners, certificates and a tree stump from the Woodsman of the World. Father Joze Boznar and Father John Kumse graciously loaned the SMA items for the religious and church exhibit, including antique vestments, hymnals and photos.

Additional literature was provided by the Slovenian Consulate regarding the changing face of Slovenia today, particularly their presidency of the European Union earlier this year.

The museum is now dedicated and will soon be staffed and is open to donations and to any volunteers. There is also still time to become a founding member. Thus far there are more than 40 founding memberships representing individuals, corporations and companies. Substantial grants came from the Republic of Slovenia, the Richmond Brothers Foundation and the City of Cleveland. The SMA looks forward to reaching its goal of 100 founding members by the end of this year.

Suggested items for donation include photos and film, artwork, clothing and textiles, national costumes, family treasures brought from Europe, musical instruments, music, family histories, maps, books, postcards, audio recordings and documents from Slovenian organizations, among others. Those who wish to make a donation can call with any ideas for further information.

The committee reminds all that now is the time to be a part of this exciting venture, to celebrate and preserve our Slovenian Heritage in a permanent location within the Slovenian community.
